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Chairman's Report

o my brothers and sisters in Christ at Applewood Community Church,

We have been given a great responsibility as followers of Christ and leaders in the church, but we also want to take time to prayerfully consider the leading of the Holy Spirit as we allow Him to work in our church and lives.

There were many parts of 2016 that seemed familiar to other years, but still also many areas of growth. This year the FOST (Fruitful Organizational Structure Team) met several times to determine if Applewood Community's current leadership structure might need to be adjusted to meet the current needs of the church and help us move into the next years of our church life together. Dear Friends,

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ! I am deeply grateful for the partnership we share as *churches working together to transform lives and communities by starting new churches, strengthening existing churches, and developing missional leaders.* We continue to see evidence of God's great work and the faithfulness of his people as Midwest Conference churches live into this shared mission.

This summer we had the joy of partnering with central Kansas churches to plant New Life Covenant Church in Wichita. In addition, we launched two enhanced, six-month church planting residencies in partnership with two of our Regional Church Planting Groups—one at Celebration Covenant Church in Omaha, Nebraska, in preparation for planting a bilingual church in Omaha, and one at Grace Place in Berthoud, Colorado, in preparation for planting in planters and thriving community north of Denver. Through this model of establishing partnerships between church planters and thriving churches, these residencies will help propel new churches in a healthy direction as they leverage of Parker, Colorado, was approved and began their training with an anticipated covenant agreement in early 2017. We have been blessed with a diverse group of church planters who join our existing churches to reach more people

Midwest Conference staff, pastors, and lay leaders have been working together to strengthen and resource our churches through a variety of learning opportunities, including conversations on race, leadership development workshops, Latino leadership gatherings, a preaching cohort, think tanks, etc. This year we introduced the Ministry Development Workshop in partnership with Freedom Fire Ministries and the Evangelical Covenant Church. This workshop helps church planters and organizations in under-resourced communities find alternative pathways to offerings of this workshop in 2017!

None of this would be possible without your encouragement, perseverance in prayer, and generous partnership. I invite you to join us at the Annual Ministry Celebration to be held at Community Covenant Church in Lenexa, Kansas, on April 28-29, 2017, where we will highlight all of this and more as we celebrate another year of shared ministry. We look forward to joining you in praising God for the work he is doing throughout our conference and beyond!

As your congregation gathers for its own Annual Meeting, I pray that it, too, will be a celebration of all that God is doing within your local context. Thank you for the privilege of serving alongside you in ministry. We pray for you and give gratitude to God for the difference you are making across the MWC region.

fter giving some thought about what to write in my 2016 Annual Report, I have decided to take a more personal approach. For me, 2016 goes down as a pivotal year in my life; one of both personal challenge and great encouragement; a year in which I was reminded in significant ways of truth that I have known for years but, by God's grace, it impacted me more deeply than I can ever remember.

As you may recall, I had surgery for prostate cancer in November of 2015. That set me on a course of recovery and therapy that would last the better part of 2016. All of this was done with much prayer and the fervent hope that I would soon be cancer free. But I wasn't! So, the battle against cancer continues. And, it is in that journey that significant truth seeped into my life and began to grab my heart in

ways that I had never experienced. So, it is in that vein that I want to reflect with you on some of the lessons learned. I know that this is a departure from the usual annual report but, since 2016 was a departure from my usual life, it seems

right that I share it with you, my AWCC family! I will frame it around four words: Humility, Gratitude, Perspective and Trust. No particular order—they all kind of flow together!

Let me begin with a few thoughts on humility! James 4:6 states, God opposes the proud and gives grace to the humble. Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Come near to God and he will come near to you. I'll be honest—I don't think of myself as a prideful person. Who does, right? It's not my style to call attention to or promote myself. It's just not honoring to God! But, in this journey, He has shown me pride of a different stripe—that of self-sufficiency. I am not one to easily admit need or weakness or to ask for help. But. I have to tell you, in those first weeks following surgery, I needed help in many ways (I'll spare you the details). However, I remember the day that friends showed up at my house

to rake my leaves—and there I sat, watching them work. It was so humbling! After all, I'm the pastor! I'm supposed to be the one who is always strong and serving others, right? I learned that an admission of weakness and need can be a form of resisting the devil, and he truly does flee in those times because I was forced to draw near to God and He came near to me. I love that—experiencing Him in times of need through the words and actions of those He brings into my life! I am so thankful for all the prayers and kindness that you showed to me in this past year. You ministered to me in many ways and it was a good life lesson; one that I do not want to forget!

Another lesson has to do with gratitude! Crazy as it sounds, my granddaughter Nora (13 months old) is a constant reminder of the

importance of gratitude. Her presence is a gift that brings great joy and I am reminded of how rich my life is with her in it. It makes me want to live life to the fullest; to watch her grow up and live the life to which God calls her. Living with a potentially fatal disease has

given me a renewed sense of gratitude for each day that God gives and the relationships that are part of it. We all have a choice in life: we can moan and groan about things we don't have or we can be thankful for the things that we do have. The latter is a better choice and I think it's what Paul had in mind when he exhorted the Thessalonians to give thanks in all circumstances. No matter how difficult life may be, we can live with gratitude because of the gift of relationships we have—with our loving Heavenly Father and others with whom we share life. Indeed, life can be very hard and living it with gratitude for others is the key to living it well.

Little Nora is a gift from God who reminds me of this every time I am with her. She symbolizes the beautiful gifts God has given me in the relationships of my life; my sweetheart and life partner Charissa, my kids, my AWCC family, friendships that span decades and, ultimately, a relationship with

God who loves me more than I can comprehend. I have much for which to be grateful!

A third lesson learned is one closely related to gratitude—I call it perspective, and it has had a two-fold impact upon me. First of all, there is the realization of what is really important in life. I remember sitting with my dad in the final days of his life. Knowing that he was going to die soon, he expressed several regrets and every one of them had to do with relationships. There were no regrets about lack soul. Trust in God means just that—trusting of money and "stuff". None! Every regret he expressed had to do with those he loved: not enough time spent together, not enough "I love you" spoken, etc. Staring his mortality in the face, dad had crystal clear perspective on what was really important in life! My friends, none of us knows how much time we have in this life! I want to invest deeply in the things that really matter and I am grateful for the continued opportunity I have to do so!

The other lesson of perspective has come several times when I have been having a pity party for myself! In the midst of it, someone or some group of people who are suffering will pop into my head and, inevitably, I find myself thinking, "C'mon Guy, things could be much worse." In those times, perspective reminds me that there is always someone for whom life loving me and walking is much more difficult. That reminder has been a great gift from God because what often follows the "aha moment" is a desire to pray for others in difficult situations. What a blessing that is!

Last of all, but certainly not least, is a lesson about trust. Simply put: I've learned that speaking about trust is a whole lot easier than living into it. I have found that often my trust is tied to the sense of control I think I have in a situation. More control (i.e. resources) elevates my trust because really, if God does not come through, I can probably take care of things myself. HAH! Now, I'm no genius, but I'm pretty certain that is not trust! Living with

cancer brings trust into focus and reveals it for what it really is in my life! I can engage in all kinds of treatments and follow the protocols exactly, but bottom line, there are no guarantees but one: the truth that my loving Heavenly Father is sovereign and watching over my life, and is working His plan for my good (think Christ-like character) and His glory!

My life is in His very capable hands. He holds the power of life and death and, regardless of what comes to me in this life, it is well with my

Him to do what is best because that is always what He does for His children.

So, my AWCC brothers and sisters, that's it for this year's report! I am grateful for the things that this cancer journey has taught me and glad to share a few of them with you. I rejoice in the life that we have together and want you to know how thankful I am for you. I am blessed to be your pastor! Thanks for with me in these days!

We have continued to use Group's Hands-On curriculum in our classes, to learn in the way Jesus taught, using everyday objects to illustrate and make the lesson stick. The kids have worked hard on memorizing Bible verses each week during the school year in order to hide God's Word in their heart that it can help them in any situation in life.



Arise

I always enjoy extra time with our 4th-6th graders for what we call Arise. This is a special time for them to get together to dig deeper and learn more about living for God, whether through lessons and fun activities or service projects. Here are a couple of things we did this year:

 Valentine's Day craft with assisted living residents at Colorado Lutheran Home. The seniors and kids enjoyed making Valentine "love monster" decorations and spending the time together.

- In March we went to the JeffCo Action Center and spent 2 hours packing 450 boxes with non-perishable food to help families in need in our community.
- In April we made 20 "Blessing Bags" to be handed out to the homeless. The bags included some non-perishable food, socks, water, chapstick, Bible verses, a note of hope from our kids, among other helpful items. Families keep these bags in their cars to hand out as they see opportunities.





Vacation Bible School

This year we were able to host a Vacation Bible School at Applewood. It was the first VBS I have been a part of, and I felt like it was a valuable week. We had an average of about 32 kids per day, with roughly half who already attended Applewood and about half from the neighborhood.

We learned about how "God's love H.E.L.P.S. others" through lessons, games, crafts, snacks, songs, and puppet shows that centered around one of the letters in H.E.L.P.S. each day (i.e. E stood for encouraging others). The VBS that we used was based off a free curriculum from Forgotten Voices International, and





we were able to configure it to fit AWCC. We had a lifesize zebra and giraffe, who were a hit, thanks to Tina

Simmons. And nearly the whole church was decorated with a safari theme.

Thank you to everyone who helped with VBS, whether donating money or supplies, helping with planning or art projects, decorating, or participating and leading during the week. Our





church was able to support our own kids and also look outward and extend a hand to the community.

Based on the experience and feedback from 2016, I am planning on putting together another VBS for 2017. We will be learning about the *Fruit of the Spirit* at *BigHeart Farms, where God's fruit grows*!

Other Highlights from Children's Ministries 2016

- In January I attended the <u>Children, Family and Intergenerational Ministries</u> Covenant event in Chicago. What a blessing it was to get to meet and spend time talking with and learning with other Children's Ministries Directors from the Covenant churches across America. I went to several sessions to learn more about leading children and families, and I was able to connect with other people who do what I do. I had the opportunity to ask questions and get some great ideas from them (and hopefully share some ideas that were valuable to them as well).
- Winter Trailblazer camp was in February, and we had a great time! We took 6 kids to the Covenant Heights camp in Estes Park. Jeremy Noce went as the boys' leader (and drove us all there and back - big thanks!), and I had a blast





with the girls. We went as a group to worship and hear lessons, had great devotional times, did arts

and crafts, played gaga ball, flew on the zipline, roasted s'mores, and more. This was my first time to lead a group to camp, and I was nervous at first but came away from the experience with an excitement for going again and a belief that it is a good faith building-block for the kids.

- In May we had an ice cream party to celebrate all the work and effort the kids put into memorizing Bible verses throughout the school year. I was particularly touched by a family who brought their preschooler to show him the reward and start teaching him early that it is important to hide God's Word in our hearts.
- We had 31 people at the <u>volunteer training</u> in August. I know I said it above, but I so appreciate the group of people who are willing to put the time and effort into preparing and teaching our kids each week. They really love the kids of AWCC. We had a fun time preparing for the 2016-17 school year and bonding as a team.
- We had 2 kids from Children's Ministries who were baptized

this year, including sweet Liliana Pinto and a baby baptism for Grant Melby. It is always a blessing to see kids (and adults) express their love for the Lord publicly and to see our church family come around them in support and celebration.

• I was so pleased that we could be a part of the Community

Bible Experience this year. We did several lessons with the kids downstairs as the parents discussed the reading upstairs each week. It was neat to hear the kids' perspectives on reading straight through the New Testament, and I look forward to doing something



like this again and perhaps integrating more of an intergenerational study in our church.

• For the kids' Christmas program this year we took on the topic of peace. Each of the kids were interviewed, and Colleen Mead put together videos with their answers about Christmas, peace, Jesus, and what they all have to do with each other. The kids did a great job of singing Peace Has Come, I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day, and Born is the King. We all enjoyed the confetti at the end! Many thanks to Karen Chambers and Sharon Robins for their help in rehearsals and the program and to the parents and teachers who stayed after church to help us learn to sing the songs in the months leading up to the program.

Looking Forward in 2017

In planning for the new year, I have been intentionally prayerful and listening for the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Some questions that are often in my prayers include things like "How can I help make faith stick for the kids?" and "What things should I be doing to teach the current AWCC kids and to also incorporate and outward focus to reach those who so desperately need to hear the Good News?" I am passionate about the faith of our kids, my very own included, and I hope to see them grow deeper roots this year. I want to see them, even at a young age, make an impact on our world that shows that God is already victorious and loves each and every person and wants them to accept the precious gift He has so freely given.

Financial Secretary Report

his has been a year of blessing as God has continued to provide for AWCC. I praise God for each of you who have been faithful in fulfilling your commitments to this ministry. AWCC adopted a General Fund budget for 2016 of \$363,000. We ended our year with total giving to the General Fund of \$337,940 which is \$25,060 below budget.

Thanks to your generosity, AWCC raised \$2,994 for Covenant World Relief in 2016.

\$26,794 was given for the Parking Lot Renovation Fund.

Our average Sunday morning attendance for 2016 was 126 and for 2015 was 130. The numbers for attendance include children, youth and adults who attend our Sunday morning worship service.

AWCC continues to use Servant Keeper software to maintain the accuracy and efficiency of our reporting. We continue to have security problems with transmitting our contribution statements via email. To save postage we provided the 2016 year-end statements on Sunday, January 22nd and 29th, in the church lobby for those who were at church, and mailed the rest by January 31st.

God has been so faithful to provide for this ministry through your consistent and generous support. What a blessing it is to see God work through his people.

Treasurer's Report

s shown in the Financial Secretaries Report, we closed the year with \$337,940 in giving to the General Fund which was far below our budget target of \$363,000. Thanks to the frugality of staff and ministry teams, the total spending from the General Fund in 2016 was \$339,431, leaving us short by approximately \$1500. As a result, it will be more challenging to make ends meet this year. We will continue to report to the church family as the year unfolds.

Once again, we put together and submitted the budget for approval in the fall, with the intent of having an approved budget before the start of the new year. This seems to be working well so we will plan on doing the same again for the 2018 budget.

This past year we implemented on-line giving in response to several inquiries. It's a system available through "CovenantGiving" that is accessible on the AWCC website. If you haven't checked it out, please do. The most cost effective option is to make donations using electronic check directly from your checking account. Setting up regular recurring giving is also very helpful.

Our Parking Lot campaign continues and though we are not ready to begin the project, hopefully we will be soon.

I am thankful that as Treasurer, I do not work alone and am very grateful for the skills and efforts of the entire financial team: Karen Snuffer (financial secretary), Dee Harwood (accountant), Vickey Bennett and Janine Flannigan.

2016 AWCC Annual Meeting Minutes (February 14, 2016)

Call to Order
The meeting was called to order at 11:20 a.m. by Chairman Chad Lynch. A quorum was established with at least 27 members in attendance. Chad opened the

Attendees read aloud the following mission statement of AWCC:

- Celebrate God through worship
- Commit to serving others through ministry
- Cultivate spiritual growth through discipleship
- Care for one another through fellowship
- Communicate the good news through evangelism, by means of Christian formation.

<u>Highlights of 2015</u>
Chad highlighted some of the church life events that occurred in 2015, which included:

- Mikki moving on from her years of faithful service as Office Administrator and God's gracious provision in leading Bob to serve in this capacity. Bob has shown himself to be a man of God who has a passion to serve others.
- A number of AWCC members went on mission trips to Ecuador and to Honduras, sharing God's love in other countries.
- AWCC continues to have a strong contingent that serve and support the Royal Family ministries in Colorado.
- Staff continued to provide godly service to the attendees of AWCC, especially Guy who provided strong biblical teaching and care for all.
- The two worship team leaders and worship volunteers provided meaningful worship through their professional level musical abilities and love for the Lord.
- Justin's (and Rachel's) care and work with the youth ministry, including taking 6 youth to CHIC in 2015.
- Sarah's loving leadership of the children's ministry and her caring heart for children as well as the many volunteers teach our children.
- The Severe Weather ministry and Tracy's leadership throughout the year.
- The willingness of AWCC to open its building for use by others outside of our congregation, including a local Girl Scout troop, and for adult classes in technology. We show our love to those outside the church by opening our facility to them without charge.
- The Vitality Team provided a compressive review of the current ministries, including those areas that are functioning well and areas for improvement.
- The Baptism service that was held where both adults and children confessed their faith in Christ through this sacrament.
- Emma's strong music and leadership skill during her time as intern Worship Leader. She was a blessing to us all!
- In addition to the ongoing community garden, we now have an apple orchard this year. A special thanks to Cappi for her faithful service heading up this ministry to the community.

Review of the Minutes from the 2015 Annual Congregational Meeting

A motion was made, seconded and passed by unanimous vote that the 2015 annual meeting minutes are adopted as presented.

Continuing Business Parking Lot – Jim Green

- Jim provided an update on the parking lot design including a diagram of the design layout.
- The proposal is for 71 parking spaces which is similar to the current number of spaces.
- The engineering service fee was \$12,624, which came in slightly under the \$15,000 that had been allotted for this service.
- An initial estimate was obtained to remove and replace the parking lot for \$156,238. There may be areas that would lower this cost and the bid would be put out to a number of vendors, so the cost may be less. The initial cost estimate breaks down as follows:

•	Paving of parking spaces	\$88,457
•	Paving of driveways (areas between parking spaces)	\$51,887
•	Concrete draining pan	\$ 5,728
•	Dumpster pad and fencing (fencing is required)	\$ 9,486
•	Striping	\$ 680

\$156,238 Total

The following is a summary of the general discussion around this item:

- The bid includes pillar foundations for five light poles but does not include the light poles/lights themselves.
- Question Will the road base be sufficient for heavy garbage trucks to pick up the trash and not break up the surface? Yes, the road base used in the driveway areas, including leading to the trash bin, will be sufficient to accommodate heavy trucks.
- Question Can shade trees be planted throughout the parking area? While it is possible, shade trees would require the addition of irrigation to water the trees, would add costs to the current estimated bid, and would take up parking spaces.
- There will be no zoning concerns under the current plan because it is considered a repair of an existing parking lot. Zoning would be an issue if the parking area/number of parking spaces is increased.
- Question What is the next step in this process? If AWCC determines to move forward, options include:
 - Determine if AWCC wants to raise funds to pay for all or a portion of the costs prior to construction, or
 - It is believed that AWCC has an existing line of credit with the National Covenant Properties that could be used to secure a loan for this project.
 - Discussion on funding included the idea of raising a set percentage of the total estimated cost before actually moving forward with construction. For example, raise 30% of the estimated cost, or approximately \$50,000 before moving forward, then, promoting a campaign to have attendees pledge funds for the balance of the cost.
 - The current balance in 1) the "Building Fund" and 2) the "Parking Lot" is a combined total of \$31,500.
 - Question How long would the parking lot be under construction? It is estimated the construction will take 2-3 weeks. Parking during the construction would be on the street and the grassy area on the south side of the church.
 - A discussion occurred on the current low price of oil and how this impacts asphalt paying prices. It was generally agreed that acting while oil prices are down may be a cost benefit to this project.
 - A member suggested that AWCC carefully consider spending this amount of money on a parking lot when there are so many ministry needs in our community, country and world. This led to several comments about the current parking lot being a liability hazard and the need to take action
 - Question Could the lot could be replaced in stages with the area closest to the church being finished first and have parking spots designated for those needing close in parking? Yes, the lot could be done in stages but the net cost would likely be more in the end.

- It was noted that the original parking lot is believed to be approximately 56 years old and while it has had several repairs, the typical life expectancy of an asphalt lot is about 20 years. The current lot has clearly outlived its life expectancy by 30 plus years and is in need of complete
- Bids are typically good for 30 days, so the finances should be in place before we solicit any new bids.
- If we determine to move forward after saving an agreed upon percentage of the overall cost, who will be in charge of the capital fund drive? It was suggested that if we move forward, the Council should identify and appoint a team to lead a fund drive.

After further discussion, a motion was made, seconded and passed by majority vote with one opposed and one abstention, and it was

Resolved, to proceed with replacing the parking lot once there is \$50,000 of "cash in the bank" designated for this purpose, and an additional \$25,000 in pledges. Once these amounts are achieved, competitive bids should be obtained.

2015 Council of Deacons Overview
Chad provided a summary of the duties performed by the Council. The Council meets the first Monday of each month and is open to anyone who wants to attend. Council members provide reports of activities on their respective areas of ministry and spend time in discussion and prayer for the church. Those on the Council during 2015 were:

- Financial Secretary Karen Snuffer
- Treasurer Jeff Rich Ellen Baldacci
- Discipleship Nat Weeks
- Worship & Art Andy Platt
- Secretary Lori Finn. Rosie Hughes served as an interim in this position when Lori stepped down
- Properties Cappi Baumgart. Greg Green volunteered to serve in this position as Cappi's term has expired.
- Administry Rick Baldacci filled this position as an interim.

Chad requested a motion that Ellen, Rick, Rosie and Gregg be affirmed to serve in their respective positions on the Council. It was so moved, seconded and passed by unanimous vote and it was

Resolved, that Ellen serve as Treasurer, Rick serve in the position of Administry, Rosie as Secretary and Greg serve as Grounds and Facilities.

Ellen Baldacci provided the following financial information and information concerning the 2016 budget:

- The 2016 financial report was delayed somewhat because it was determined to remove some proprietary information from the report to protect both the privacy of staff and the church. The financial report was submitted and made available at the meeting.
- AWCC has launched "on-line giving" capabilities. The program being used is established by Covenant Giving, a not-for profit organization.
- 2016 will be considered a pilot program that will be monitored and evaluated at the end of the year.
- For the program to be successful, a number of giving units will need to use it.
- The transaction cost for using a credit card for giving on line is \$.35 plus 1.5% of the amount given.
- To give online, go to the AWCC website and launch the "on-line giving" tab.

<u>Fruitful Organizational Structures Team (FOST)</u> Heather Platt provided the following update on the FOST:

- AWCC is currently using a Council of Deacons to oversee church ministries. Heather reviewed a document prepared by FOST that provides detailed information on the concepts current being explored.
- FOST was tasked with exploring different governance models to determine whether other models would benefit AWCC.
- Many congregations are now being led by a Leadership Model that has a 4-5 member
- leadership team. That leadership team assists people in ministries but those ministries no longer have a Council representative. This would address the struggle encountered when people who lead a ministry area must also attend Deacon Council meetings and therefore fulfill a dual role.
- Under the Leadership Model, management is left to the ministry teams. The Leadership Team role is to primarily spend time in prayer and seek God's direction in the direction and ministry of the church.
- FOST and the Council of Deacons are recommending AWCC consider the Leadership Team model. FOST is still reviewing how this model would operate at AWCC.
- With the consent of the congregation, FOST will prepare a proposal for congregation consideration and action. If a change is adopted, it will require revising the current church's constitution. A revision to the constitution requires action at the church annual meeting. If adopted, the change then becomes effective at the following annual meeting.
- General discussion included whether the Leadership Model is really all that different from the current Council of Deacons; whether the Leadership Model is more effective in a larger congregation and whether the vision of the church should be limited to a small group of members. Other comments included that the Leadership Model may favor the individual gifts of some members of AWCC, who may be interested in a particular ministry but not be interested in serving in a Council position. Heather responded that as the FOST members continue their review, they will consider these issues.
- Heather asked the congregation if they would approve the ongoing review by FOST and the Council of Deacons to continue to explore a change of the governance to the Leadership Model.

A motion was made, seconded and passed by majority vote and it was

Resolved, that the congregation endorse the ongoing study of potentially changing the governance of AWCC from a Council of Deacons to a Leadership

Submission of Annual Report

Council members have submitted their individual annual reports electronically and are considered adopted as a part of the annual meeting.

Chad shared information on important events that will take place in 2016, including:

- •AWCC will conduct a Vacation Bible School this coming summer. Sarah will head this ministry to our children and the children of the neighborhood.
- Anniversary Chad noted that Guy and Charissa have been serving AWCC for 15 years. Several people took the opportunity to thank Guy for his faithful service, his leadership and his inspired sermons. Guy has been a role model of a godly man.
- Guy stated that John Wenrich, founding pastor of AWCC, has been nominated for the position of Executive Minister. This position is responsible for starting and strengthening churches. The position will be voted on at the domination's annual meeting in June 2016.
- •Guy thanked the staff for their support during this past year and how they give themselves to their ministries. He also thanked Heather for heading up FOST and her strategic skills in organizing this team.

The meeting was closed in prayer at 1:15 p.m.
